We were on big happy family in the Unit and that same spirit exists in the Association. When and where a person joined the unit is of no consequence whatscever.

If the fight for subsistence inTimor has given certain chaps the mistaken idea that Timor veterans where the only ones, catered for, then they can get rid of the idea immediately The subsistence fight was one big job that had to be carried on until cur claims were met, and it is now very much behind us.

Our idea of an Association is one for all and all for one, irrespective of whether you were an original member of the Unit or a reinforcement. The Association wants you to come along to meetings and enjoy yourself and meet your friends on common ground. You all talk the one language and you can be sure that if you come along to a meeting you will be keeping up the main object of the Association of fostering those friendships made in the Unit.

COMMITTEE COMMENT

Further advice was received from the Minister for the Army re Creardo's in Timor. We have now a most attractive and fitting Memorial Plaque, and our thanks go cut to Don Murray and Mr L. Duffy, for their generosity and hard work in making this available to us.

An appeal was made to this State for contributions towards the "Jack O'Brien Memorial Fund", and here egain our State was not found to be backward. Your Editorial Committee has produced a bigger and better news letter, and it is sufficient to say that the news letter is one of our outstanding successes. Enquiries were made to the War Crimes Commission to make certain that the Timor criminals had not been overlooked. It was gratifying to receive official assurance that this was not the case. With such a healthy group of men, our hospital visitations have not been numerous, but on several occasions visits have been made to sick members, and they were appreciated. We are now in the throes of trying to arrange remuneration for our old "Creadces" in Timer. and we have hopes that some official recognition will be afforded Our Sweep this year was a prenounced success, and it is them. necessary that future Sweeps be equally as well patronised, as of course the bulk of our funds are raised in this fashion. Our financial position is extremely sound, and details will be referred ' elsewhere in this news letter. Our two group visits to the Blood Bank have resulted in a large number of our members being on regular call. It might not be out of place to suggest that some other members might take an interest in this worthy cause, and get themselves enrolled with the Blood Bank.

Anzac Day this year was successful from the poin of view of the members who attended, and the usual sequel had the usual result!

Lastly, and I think most important, was the well attended Commemoration Day in King's Park. It is fitting that we should regard this particular day as the most important in cur Association year. The majority of us who returned from the War are able to take advantage of the facilities and pleasures afforded by our comradeship. Therefore, it surely behaves us on this one day of the year, to make a very small sacrifice in joining together in rememberance. Next year it is hoped that the attendance on this sacred day will be bigger than ever before.

TREASURERS REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st MAY, 1951.

Success has once more been achieved on the financial side of our activities. This is the result of increased effort by members and their Committee. As times are good, such success is to be expected and provision should be made for the future, when times may not be good and most certainly, Members fewer and perhaps in need.

Again we were dependent upon Sweep monies (to the extent of about £70) in order to balance the books. We should lock forward to the years in which we cover all expenses from ordinary income. From the point of view of attendances at meetings, a few extra on each occasion would have covered expenditure in this direction. What really makes the Treasurer tremble is a grand total of 16 or so at monthly meetings planned to accommodate a bare minimum of 30.

Membership has again risen. We now have 182 m members on the books, of which 151 are financial, 31 in arrear to the extent of 44 subscriptions and 71 subscriptions in advance. As the efforts of the Association have been fruitful, the few remaining without the fold may still show 5/- worth of appreciation per annum.

In conclusion, I thank the Members for their co-operation which is much appreciated.

Some effort should be made to collect subscriptions which are in arrear. This amount has grown to £11.-.-. in the financial year, just concluded, and members should realise their responsibility to the Association and try and have this amount cleared by next year.

Finally I would like to congretulate the Treasurer on the excellent manner in which he has kept the Bocks and records of the Association. The simple and straight-forward manner of Bockkeeping has made the Annual Audit one of extreme simplicity.
