An Experience In Living Dangerously

The recent decision of the Federal Government to despatch a Battalion of Australian Infantry with Auixliary Arms to Vietnam is a very thought provoking exercise

in world politics.

This present theatre of warand no matter how it is viewed it is a theatre of war-has all the earmarks of pre-war China and the famous or infamous Japanese invasion. The Japs strove valiantly and unsuccessfully for over ten years to bring the "incident" o a successful conclusion. Frustrated for years by guerilla warfare by a peasantry which tilled the fields while the troops were breathing down their necks and fighting furiously the minute the enemy were looking the other way. Knowing friend or foe was impossible and that is just the situation in Viet-

The situation has some of the hall marks also of the early struggle in Korea where telling a South Korean from a North Korean was again an experience in living dan-

gerously.

The fluidity of the battlefields, the impossibility of the terrain to make for a subjective battlefront will test the ingenuity of the Australian troops to the utmost.

While it is admitted that the Communist forces were successfully ejected from the Malayan peninsular this is a very different situation in which the power pol-

itics of the whole world are enjoined in a small country. China is anxious to embarrass the West to the best of her ability without actual involvement.

The area does to some extent resemble the Spanish Civil War in which the battlefield of Spain was used as a testing ground by the Axis and Communist powers. This appears to be the case in Vietnam with China, Russia and the West meeting head on in a collison of ideollogies purely for the purpose of arresting the attention of the other Asian countries.

The pro and con as to whether Australia has made a correct decision in being involved in this situation will only be settled by the future historians. The Australian troops who have to carry the burden have won themselves a bad marble (no reflection on the National Service ballot intended) as a more stench filled avenue would be hard to imagine and they are going to require the backing of all the people of this country to carry through successfully. For better or for worse the decision of commital has been made, the dice has been cast and it now behoves the nation to stand four-square behind her fighting men and see they do not lack for the things which will make their intolerable task as a little more bearable.
