Though finally forced to relinquish his job when classified T.P.I. in 1974, Kevin never lost his interest in people, and in life. He recently nominated as a candidate for election to the committee of the W.A. T.P.I. Association. Nominations closed the day he died.

Perhaps he foresaw the future, in that he recently obtained a second Double Red Diamond Badge, so that there would be one for each of his twin sons. All who were close to him know that his last years were full and happy ones, and he left without suffering too severely. We will remember him.

This was a labour of love and beautifully carried out and one that was long overdue. The folio has been admired and passed around among members and DAVE leaves us this everlasting reminder of his dedication to what he considered his duty.

In private life Dave was an artist and loved to paint and do silk screen printing. There must be very few members of the Association who have not been recipients of some of Dave's lovely work, whether it be a painting, a set of place mats or a handkerchief beautifully stencilled, and all members will miss this year his personally designed Xmas Cards. I know that we will.

Dave was always delighted to see his mates, and in his last weeks wished that he could have seen more of them. A tribute must be paid to Ivy his wife, whose devotion and care were his greatest comfort. To Ivy and sons David and Neil and all his family, the Association offers its sincere sympathy, but no one who saw Dave's suffering at the last can be anything but deeply thankful that his pain is now over.

HANSARD-HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES Medical Treatment for Ex-servicemen (Question No. 4216)

Dr Klugman asked the Minister for Veterans' Affairs, upon notice, on 6th June 1979:

(1) Has he received representations from the Queensland Air Force Association concerning the case of 150 ex-service airmen in Australia who eluded capture when shot down behind enemy lines in Europe and are now requesting the privileges of medical care given to ex-POWs.

(2) Will he consider the request sympathetically.

Mr Alderman — The answer to the honourable member's question is as follows:

(1) I have received represeritions from Air Vice-Marshal W.E. Townsend, C.B., C.B.E., the Federal President of the Air Force Association, in his capacity as President of the Australian Branch of the Royal Air Forces Escaping Society.

(2) I understand that this matter was considered thoroughly in 1974 when it was decided to extend full free medical and hospital treatment for all conditions to former prisoners of war. It has been carefully considered on a number of occasions since then as a result of representations from Air Vice-Marshal Townsend and others. On each occasion, it has been decided not to extend eligibility for free medical treatment to this group.

Any proposal to extend full free treatment benefits to ex-service airmen who evaded or escaped capture in Europe would need to take into acount the claims of many other veterans who spent some time in enemy controlled territory but evaded or escaped capture by the enemy. These include former members of the Forces engaged in commando-type operations in enemy controlled territory and large numbers who became separated for varying periods of time from their units while engaged in operations against the enemy.

I regret that I can see no immediate prospect of an extension of treatment benefits to veterans who escaped or evaded capture in enemy or enemy occupied territory.

(The only way to pursue this any further is for every member to bring it to the attention of your local M.H.R. and ask for his support. Should their be enough backbenchers to support the claim we might get somewhere - EDITOR)

Guide rails ensure that they do not get lost or fall. My feet in their much-toohigh heels were making guite a din on the concrete ramp when I overtook a very frail old lady, painfully making her way along. I always stop to pass the time of day with any patients I encounter, as they love to hear a new voice and have a little chat. I said "Good Morning how are you today?. She turned a laughing face towards me and said roquishly "I heard you coming along behind me, your little feet tap-tapping away there - your laughing feet''.

"'My laughing feet", I repeated, not quite understanding.

"Your feet sounded as though they were laughing, my dear", she explained, "yes, just as if they were laughing". I looked at her serene old face, at the faded eyes staring into the darkness, at her arthritus twisted shuffling old feet, and thanked God I still had "LAUGHING FEET".
