SAFARI NEWS

Certain areas of this project need some clarity and this article is written specifically for that purpose.

W.A. is not trying to outshine any other state, what they are trying to do is to make sure that the accommodation is adequate, the price commensurate with the facilities, all those coming are under the one roof, for this is what Safari's are all about, it generates goodwill, mateship and gives all the ability to be able to spend maximum time with each other. It certainly makes for easier organising and creates a common meeting ground for all who attend, for certainly there will be those who stay in Caravan Parks or may be with friends.

We started early giving all those who have nominated they are coming a picture of what is taking place. (From the time all delegates from other states decided W.A. was to be the next Safari venue, it was not going to be cheap. Travelodge was chosen as an accommodation area, T.A.A. as official carriers and this was published so as we could get onto the Convention Bureau Listing, this has happened.

The Organising Committee have covered Perth looking for the ideal accommodation we are not geared for Tourism as are those on the Eastern seaboard, except in the luxury hotels and motels. Out of the blue and because of our Convention Listing we received an invitation to view the Freeway Hotel. This proved to be a winner in every way, facilities are first class and they projected a 1983 price for twins and doubles of \$37 per day, a drop of \$8 on our quote from Travelodge.

There has been mention made by some members of booking in at Hotels in Perth. This in not on-(a) because most will not project a price, (b) because facilities are not what we want for our Unit members and their wives, (c) the quote from one Hotel was only \$2 cheaper than the place we have chosen and there is no comparison!

We have booked the Freeway Hotel which is beautifully located in South Perth, has all conveniences in the rooms, T.V. tea and coffee making facilities, bath and showers, twin or double beds, whichever is required, serviced daily, ironing facilities available, laundry service daily, swimming pool, cocktail bar, hospitality room, banquet hall for our formal dinner and breakfast available in the room or the dining hall.

Access to the city is ideal by bus which run frequently, about 8 minutes to the heart of Perth, by Ferry across

the Swan River which is a pretty trip and very relaxing and is only five minutes walk from the Freeway.

The committee will continue their efforts to make the Safari within the reach of all and if there are those who require alternate accommodation we will help to get what they require, but you will find our final price will be as near the best possible.

If any member has spare monies at any time do not hesitate to send it to us for we will do the bookkeeping and have it earning interest to further reduce the price structure. Do not wait if you have some dollars to spare, it will make the planning of your Safari trip a little easier than doing it in one lump sum.

The "Roll Call" to say farewell to "Slim" by the unit members, their wives and lasses already bereaved, was first class indeed, indicating the esteem in which members held him. Members of the Dudley Park Bowling Club in Mandurah chartered a special bus to be in attendance, his pals in the racing fraternity and personal friends made up a very big crowd to pay their last respects to an old and dear friend.

Our deepest sympathy goes out to Kate his wife, and his two sons Greg and Murray. Kate shouldered a big load for a long time and was a wonderful support to "Slim" in his hour of need. To you Kate and your family our best love, may time heal the void left by the loss of our old mate Harvey, your lifelong partner.

FRED GARDINER

Though not a unit member, Fred Gardiner who passed away recently played a big part in the formation of the 2/2nd Commando Association, so much so, he was made an Honorary Life Member.

TRIBUTE TO FRED GARDINER

RECOGNISED BY NASA

The death occurred recently of Mr Frederick, at the age of 72.

Mr Gardiner was born in guildford, and although he lived at Bassendean until his marriage, he spent much of his time at Guildford where his grandparents lived.

Mr Gardiner's parents, George and Amy Gardiner, were well-known in the

Bassendean area.

After his marriage to Jean Hasson, of Toodyay, Mr Gardiner left the area, and the couple spent the war years at Rawlina.

He was a Supervisory Technical Officer with the former PMG Department and was very active in the affairs of the Australian Postal Institute.

It was for his outstanding work in those two areas that he was awarded the British Empire Medal, and later the Imperial Service Medal for long service.

His work and ability were recognised by NASA (The American National Aeronautics and Space Administration) from which he received a Special Award relating to his work with the Carnarvon Tracking Station during the Apollo 11 space flight.

Mr Gardiner was a keen sportsman,

particularly in bowls.

He started the bowling club at the Postal Institute and when later he moved to Nedlands he became President and Life Member of Nedlands Bowling Club.

He was also a Freemason and achieved high rank at an early age in his lodge, Star of the West.

Mr Gardiner is survived by his wife, Jean, and three sons.

I had the privilege of attending a 2/2nd Commando reunion some years ago and was introduced to Alex.

I want you to know how much I admired him and his mates who took part in Australia's history.

The Timor commandos, by forcing the Japs to tie up theirtwo best fighting divisions (the 48th and 51st Japanese Divisions) when the battles of the kokoda Trail and MilneBay and Guadalcanal wre in the balance, turned the scales in the Pacific War.

There are those, in their fear of Indonesia, who want to forget all about

Timor, but they will never get away with it, and I am sure the day will come when the Commando Memorial overlooking Dill (destroyed by the Indonesians) will eventually be re—erected.

A WARTIME FLASHBACK 1942

Darwin in the years pre-war was a sleepy hollow, a stopover for airmen and women who were pioneering air routes from all over the world, to we city dwellers an isolated place in the far North of Australia.

Today it is the "Gateway" to our country with a population nigh on 50,000, has become the Capital of the Northern Territory now having its own Parliament, as modern a city after its devastation by "Cyclone Tracy," as one could wish to see, the rebuilding is superb.

Back in 1942, it was the focal point of a Japanese attack on the Australian mainland, an event which had a profound effect on the role of the 2/2nd Independent Company which is now history.

A very interesting diary had been kept on all the Japanese raids and Peter Walter, who lives in Nightcliff, a suburb of Darwin, has kindly sent an extract of the diary and we are deeply indebted for such a piece of history appearing in our Courier. Thanks Peter.

EXTRACT OF DIARY-DARWIN 19TH FEBRUARY, 1942.

First raid on Darwin was on Thursday 19th February, at 10.15a.m. bombs were dropped on wharf, Post Office, Shipping and Myilly Point, 13 ships were sunk. It was estimated that 900 were killed on wharf and ships.

The second raid was at 12.15p.m. at R.A.A.F. 'Drome at 4 mile (now Parap)

20th Feb.

Administrator and Superintendent of Police left Darwin

and Military Barracks empty.

4th March

Two Jap. planes machine gunned railway men repairing the tracks at 4 mile. They set fire to two planes at R.A.A.F. on the ground. Time 3.30p.m.

16th March

14 Jap. bombers bombed the R.A.A.F. building- time 2.30p.m. Japs bombed Daly St and Myilly Point. Nearly

copped one.

22nd March On Sunday two air raids were made on Civil 'Drome (grass now Ross Smith Avenue) and Katherine 'Drome 200 miles inland.

28th March

R.A.A.F. 4 mile bombed.

31st March

First raid on R.A.A.F. time 10.30p.m.

2nd April

Shell oil tanks were bombed. Houses in Harvey and McMinn

Streets were damaged.

4th April

Big air battle over Darwin Harbour. Bombs dropped at

2½ Mile and R.A.A.F. Japs lost many planes
