TIMOR MEMORIAL

Replacement of Plaque at Dare Memorial Pool and Resting Place.

Many have wondered what has happened to this Memorial, a very small token of our thanks to the magnificent "Timorese Helpers." Many of our boys were present at the dedication and renewed old friendships of yester years.

With the withdrawal of the Portugese and then the annexation by Indonesia, plus the subsequent news and visitation blackout, it was anybodys guess as to what really happened in Timor, and of indeed, our Memorial had been spared.

Only in recent weeks has it opened up. Bernie Callinan wrote to me asking if I could supply the text, layout and inscription on the Memorial Plaque at Dare. In fact the State President of Victoria R.S.L., B.C. Ruxton O.B.E. had taken up the cudgels on receipt of a letter from the National Secretary of the R.S.L. of Australia, Peter Young who also wrote to all State Secretaries. We are indeed indebted to them for their tremendous interest and support.

Hereunder are the letters concerned that created the picture:-

Dear Arch,

Sir Bernard Callinan informs me that he wrote to you concerning the Commemorative Plaque erected by the 2/2 Commando Association in Dili.

I am enclosing herewith a copy of the letters I have received from Peter Young, the National Secretary of the R.S.L. concerning the Plague.

As you can see the original has been stolen and they wish to replace it. As soon as you can give me some idea of the wording I will then inform those concerned

with the replacement of the Plaque.

Dear Bruce.

I write to you direct rather than through the State Secretary as would be my normal channel, on a personal matter regarding the Commemorative Plaque which records the assistance provided to Australian troops by the East Timorese during World War Two in Dili.

We have today received a request from the Department of Foreign Affairs asking for the wording on the original Plaque. I know that you are interested in this matter and I would ask whether you would undertake this request as a personal matter.

I have further advised the Department of Foreign Affairs that I am sure that the League would move to assist financially

any replacement of the Plaque and in any subsequent ceremony of re-dedication.

Dear Sir.

We have today received a request from the Department of Foreign Affairs asking for information on the wording of the Commemorative Plaque at Dili in East Timor which records the assistance given to Australian troops by the East Timorese during World War Two.

This plaque made of brass and copper, has been stolen and the Regional Commander in East Timor, Colonel Kalangle, would like to replace it. I would be most grateful if you could request the Editors of your journals to run this item calling for any information and asking that any information be sent direct to myself at National Headquarters.

Further to that, we will be most grateful for an appeal in those same columns for the return of the original Plaque with no questions asked.

John Burridge was the man of the moment for he had all the dealings regarding the Memorial Plaque at Dare and, he had retained the file over all those years. Well done John! Here is John's letter to me which was so badly needed, it was apparently inscribed in both English and Portugese. Am sure the Indonesians would not be all that interested in the Portugese inscription!

Dear Arch,

The following is the text and layout of the inscription on the Memorial Plaque at Dare.

TO THE PORTUGESE PEOPLE **EVERYWERE** FROM MINHO TO TIMOR THIS MEMORIAL HAS BEEN GIVEN FOR YOUR USE BY THE PEOPLE OF AUSTRALIA IN GRATITUDE FOR THE HELP YOU GAVE OUR SOLDIERS DURING THE SECOND WORLD WAR 1939 — 1945 AND PARTICULARLY TO THE PEOPLE OF TIMOR FROM THE MEN OF THE 2/2 COMMANDO INDEPENDENT COMPANY

WHO SERVED HERE IN 1942. The significance of Minho is that it is the northernmost province of Portugal. After much discussion with the then Governor of Portugese Timor, Brigadier Pires and Australian Consul, John Colquhoun-Denvers, it was decided that this wording was desirable. It heightened the fact that the Portugese in Timor came from all provinces in Portugal — from Minho in the north to Timor in the south. It was also worded in this way so that there was no differentiation between Portugese and ethnic Timorese.

It was given by the "people of Australia" because, after the greatest amount of lobbying I have ever been involved in, the Federal Government chipped in — \$ for \$\$. It was said they had never agreed to this type of request in the past for fear of setting a precedent.

All the best, JOHN.

Every member of the 2/2 Commando Association will be thrilled that this Plaque has been, or will be, replaced, for it is unique in every concept. Regardless of who controls Timor this Memorial is sacred ground to us all, for it carries into posterity our thanks and our love to the unforgettable Timorese people of that era who gave their all that we might live, and, to the Portugese for their terrific help.

We trust the children of today will understand and recognise the tremendous contribution to our war effort by their forebears, and, our humble "thank you" via the tangible Memorial and accompanying Plaque.

Fire was followed by flood in South Australia in such proportions as to cause millions of dollars worth of damage to crops, property and homes, fortunately not with loss of life. It must shake the strongest people to their very foundations to see a life's work disintegrate before their eyes. No wonder strong men cry.

We of all people would know just what teamwork will be needed for those so basly devastated to rise again from right off the ground. Australians show their real character in adversity, and, when their home territory is threatened or completely shattered it takes that indefinable something to take a grip, swallow the tears and grimly resolve to get back on their feet, then, rebuild from the ground floor, a new life.

On your behalf I can only say that we salute the brave, cry with the wounded, mourn the dead, pray for those who are undertaking the heartbreaking job of rising from the depths to ascend to the throne of honest endeavour by rebuilding, reshaping, reforming, that new life.

As yet there is no news of any unit member being involved.

THE WINDS OF CHANGE have blown strongly in the political arena and people Australia wide, regardless of their appilications, have shown, via the "ballot box," just how they feel regarding the current situation. Labor sailed into power on a very strong tide and they will now have to perform as a party should or the people will again show the strength that is theirs, by law and by right, to choose those who would best represent them.

It seems to me when Australia is in dire trouble all parties should get together, as happens in a wartime situation, to sort out the mess, bring out the best of all brains to get us back on the rails, then revert to party politics.

Australia to us all is an important place, it will be for our children and our childrens children, let us learn from the errors of other countries, keep it as a wonderful place to live. Give our politics a greater depth of thought, politicians representing the people as they should be represented, do not get lost in the welter of the political party and forget the welfare of Australians in total.

Start it all in your own electorate where you have been put by the people who want you to fan the, "Winds of Change," for the ultimate benefit of everyone.

Dear Arch,

Sorry about the lack of commmunication from this end but after a brief retirement I now find myself working as hard as ever, with a resultant lack of spare time. I am now in the Courier business and tearing around the city and suburbs for about 10 hours a day, a job which I quite like and find fairly profitable. I rang Col Doig early in January with the sad news about Jim English and he said you were away looking after a scout group so it appears there is no rest for the wicked.

The main reason for this note Arch is to send you the enclosed copy of the address by Gough Whitlam on Timor. I recently had the pleasure of being at a dinner given

in his honour and as I was seated next to him I was able to bash his ear at length on the Timor situation, and he sent me the copy of his address. After reading it I am left with the feeling that we have been flogging a dead horse all these years and that much of the information we have been receiving about conditions in Timor have been fabricated by certain people with an axe to grind. I know that all of us who served in Timor have a great affection for the Timorese people and have been left with the feeling that we have let them down, but the way things happened I don't believe there was any way we could have prevented the Indonesian take over of East Timor. After the war Doc. Evatt wanted Australia to obtain a 100 year lease of the territory from the Portuguese but his plan was turned down and I think this was a tradgedy for the Timorese.

After reading the note in the Courier re Julio Madeira's son, I made a few phone calls and found he is living at Bonny Rigg only a short distance away from me. I went out to see him and found he has a wife and 5 children ranging in age from 12 down to 5 years of age, plus his wife's sister about 16 and his wifes parents to look after and they are all living in a rented flat in reasonable conditions. Joe has a job as a spray painter and they are very happy to be here and are managing quite well. There are relatives in the area who are helping them. I gave them a couple of beds, clothing, crockery and money which was donated at our Christmas barbeque, some from Association funds and a personal donation and I believe they are now quite O.K. I will keep in touch with them in case they have any further needs.

To return to Jimmy English Arch — Jim had 40 years of ill health, but through it all he displayed a rare courage and a genuine concern for other people. He never complained when he was feeling sick and he never spoke a bad word about anyone he knew. His love and devotion for his family Jean, Greg and Pauline and his pride and joy for Pauline and her achievements in swimming and her personal life are an example for all of us who knew him. When he learned he had terminal cancer he rang me and said he wanted to have a wake while he was still around to enjoy it and that is exactly what we did. The end finally came in the early hours of New Years day and Jim was cremated at Waronora on the 3rd of January. There was a good roll up of 14 members and wives plus an overflowing crowd of relatives, R.S.L. members and friends to pay their last repects.
