VALE—BERNARD ALAN BROWN

It is with great regret that we have to advise of the death of Alan Brown earlier this month after a brief spell in hospital for heart surgery. He had apparently weathered the operation quite successfully and appeared to be doing well when he had a relapse and died suddenly.

Alan joined our Unit after we left Wilsons Promontory and was therefore one of the originals. He was drafted to No. 3 Section and served throughout the Timor Campaign but did not join afterwards due to ill health. He later served in Borneo.

After demobilisation he joined the "Daily Newspapers" as a machinist, eventually moving to the "West Australian" where he became foreman of the Machinist Section which actually prints the paper. This was a most onerous job and full of tension to get the papers out on time. He was forced to resign due to ill health a few years ago.

Due to the fact that Alan mostly worked night shift he was not able to take a great deal of interest in Association affairs but did attend Safaris in W.A. and joined in wherever possible.

Alan was a great family man and was much liked and respected by his friends and workmates.

The Association was well represented at the Karrakatta Crematorium which was filled by friends and relatives.

We pass on our sincere sympathy to Alan's wife Phyllis and family.

VALE—ROYCE BARROW WILKERSON

Once again we have to record the passing of one of our members. This time Royce B. Wilkerson better known to all unit members as "Wendel Wilkie" a nickname tagged on him when first he joined the unti as at that time the great "Wendel Wilkie" was Vice President of America. Quite a large number of his mates would not know his correct name he was so used to answering to his nickname. Royce departed this life on Saturday 15th November 1986 after a long illness.

Royce went back to the farming game in Goomalling after the war, and put in quite a few years before selling out and coming to live at Armadale and worked in the Kelmscott area for a considerable time.

III health forced him to give up all forms of work some 4-5 years ago.

The writer saw quite a lot of 'Wendel' in recent years and he was always excellent company or full of humour and a truly whimsical character.

Our sincere sympathy to wife Merle and his family from all the unit.
