Will be able to give you a complete pricing for the programme in the December Courier.

The coach fare Sydney - Port Macquarie - Sydney will be as follows: Fogg's Coaches, Newcastle will pick up at Mascot and/or Central Railway, at any hour, with a 5 star coach and run through express to the Port for \$900. Thus, depending on the loading, the fare reduces, e.g. 48 persons \$18.75 each, 40 persons \$22.50 each, 30 persons \$30 each. I feel sure there would be some locals or other interstaters who would be interested in this proposition. The return to Sydney would be on the same basis.

The Port Macquarie Hotel/Motel is fully booked. FAREWELL KEITH CRAIG

On Monday, July 8, 1991, former members of the 2/2nd Independent Company and Commando Company gathered in the central west town of Young to pay their last respects to their departed comrade, Keith Craig. They had journeyed from Melbourne and the towns along the border, from the far north coast of N.S.W., the northern tableland and Sydney. From far away Perth came Colin Doig, Commander of 5 Section which Keith joined when he came to the 2/2nd Independent Coy at Canungra in April, 1943.

The small stone Presbyterian church was crowded with mourners from all denominations and all walks of life. The Minister gave a brief history of Keith's life as a civilian and as a soldier. Two aspects of his character stood out clearly. His devotion to wife and family and a determined application to any task he undertook himself or was allotted to him in his role as a soldier, or in his work.

He was born in Trangie, a town in the wheat and sheep belt of western N.S.W., in 1921. He grew up in the depression years and was no stranger to hardship. A tall, lean, raw boned 'cornstalker,' he developed stamina and endurance working on the sheep and wheat stations under the hard conditions which prevailed on pre-war properties.

On his discharge from the Army he did a course in wool and sheep classing at the

pastoral section of Goulburn Technical College. With these qualifications he had no difficulty in obtaining work on the Merino studs, caring for and showing prize pedigreed rams. Haddon Rig, probably the most famous Merino Stud in Australia, was one property he worked on for several years.

In 1958 deteriorating health forced him to seek other employment. He and his wife Betty decided on Young as a suitable place to live, rear and educate their children. Keith obtained work in the hardware store. By 1968 his health was so bad he had to retire. Spinal Cellabella, the first symptoms of which had affected him in 1948 had, by 1968, played havoc with his nervous system and a strong robust man was reduced to a shadow of the man we knew so well in Army days.

Keith died in the Mercy Home, Young, July 3, 1991. The records will show that from 1968 Keith was an invalid — the records are wrong. Keith commenced to be an invalid with the first attack on his system in 1948. It was only courage and determination that kept him going until 1968. From that time till his death I saw him fairly often. It was heart breaking to see that once healthy man reduced to complete helplessness and most inspiring to see the courage, fortitude and determination he showed right to the end. I saw him less than 48 hours before he died.

Ninety one people stood, huddled under umbrellas, on a bleak, cold day to see Keith laid to rest. The sad, mournful notes of the Last Post were at one with their feelings as they bade a final farewell to their friend and comrade. Keith Craig was a living example on how to take life in good times and in adversity, courage, devotion, determination and fortitude, virtues he possessed in abundance.

May God keep him in His special care.

To Betty his wife, and children Phillip and Janette, we extend our deepest sympathy in your sad loss. Your consolation, all the grand times you shared together down through the years.

My special thanks to Jack Hartley who drove 500 miles through driving rain and fog transporting Col Doig and myself to Young and back to Sydney.

I would also like to bid a last farewell to Jim Smiles. He has left us with a living memory and a history of the Unit from its foundation to its return from its first campaign in December 1942. Jim had a great ability to record our doings with humour, satire, and above all a gentle dig to let us know we were all just plain humans with 'ups and downs.'

Dear Sir,

Greetings from East Timor!

We have received already the January and February issues of Electronics Australia Magazine. Mrs Patsy Thatcher, whose letter I just received two days ago, was the one who told me of your generosity.

Thank you so much for the magazine subscription. The information and features keep the instructors up to date with the latest. The students are able to see pictures of how some gadgets look, especially those which they would not find in East Timor. By the way, the students here learn English at school and sometimes I tend to use English words when I give my lectures, and so, somehow, they manage to understand written English with the use of a dictionary.

Mrs Thatcher might have told you of our Institute, a Technical Senior High School for boys. We have opened a new course this year, Electronics, because we have noticed that there is an increase in the number of electronic appliances coming into East Timor. Since the Timorese do not have a good background in electronics, the repairs are done by those coming from other islands. We believe that putting up an electronics course would not only fill in a need in the area, it would also build up the confidence of the people. We have also started to teach them how to use computers.

Enclosed, you will find a picture of how a part of the shop looks. We have tried to be self sufficient as possible. For example, last year we already began to fabricate our own work tables. The wood we get from the forest (trees already fallen down) so that the students taking up Woodworking can cut it up while the students in Metalwork can add up the metal sheet coverings. Now to build up the power supply and other measuring instruments still remains to be purchased. I am now arranging for some Embassies to help us finance this project. New Zealand has given us five computers recently. The Australian Embassy has given us money for some of our other needs and you too, have given us an opportunity to know more of Electronics through these magazines.

I have told the students of your gift to us and they were touched by what you have done. Many journalists and visitors have come and gone, but very few have remembered us in a helpful way. Once again, thank you.

Enclosed is a picture of the first batch of Electronics students, with the magazines and the catalogues that came along with the subscription. I wish to extend again our thanks for your contribution to our school.

We wish you the best of health and contentment. Do not forget that you have grateful friends here in East Timor praying for you.

Dear Mr Carey,

You will be pleased to know that I recently returned from East Timor with mission successfully accomplished.

When I went across in May I was not feeling too good, recuperating after the heart bypass operation, but as soon as I reached Timor and got thinking about other matters I felt a lot better.

I reached Dili and changed the money you gave me for Ernesto Kimenes Martins and drove up to Dare to find him. He was there, together with his grandson Rogerio De Arautu Martins. I do not speak Tetum, only Indonesian, and Ernesto spoke only Tetum. Nevertheless I took a friend who spoke Tetum and we conversed in that as well as in Indonesian with his grandson. I established the point that he was in fact the penjaga or guard/curator.

I asked him why the water was not running out of the main pipe properly. It was broken. Why was the water not running out of the drinking fountain. Someone had stolen the tap. So, what does he do about it? And who has responsibility for the maintenance of the area? The Department of Public Works has the responsibility for it but he has to report it first to the Camat and then he reports it to the Bupati who then requests the Department to fix it. Typical bureaucracy.

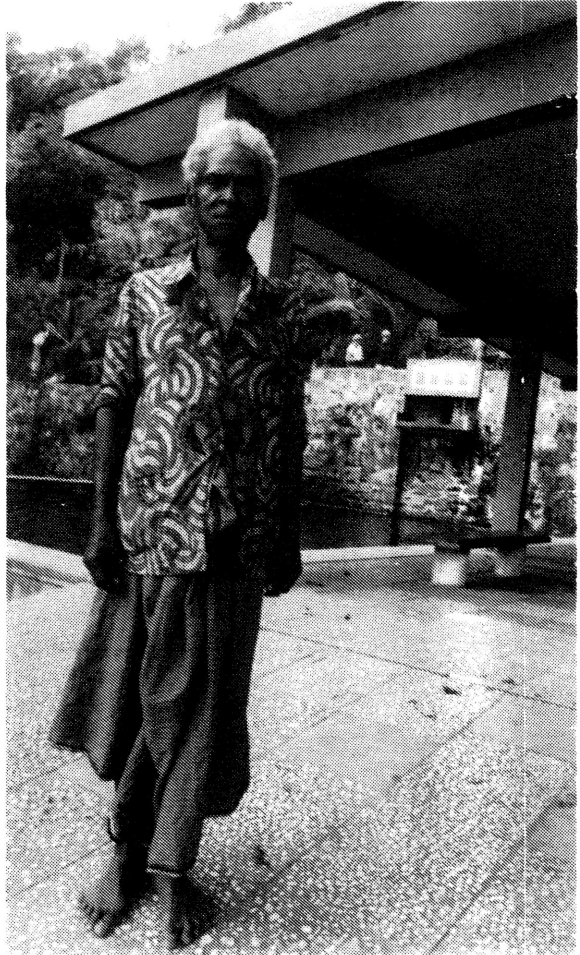
I explained to Ernesto where the money was from and for what purpose and that it was for his personal use and not to part with any of it to anyone. I explained it again in Indonesian to his grandson and he understood clearly. I then told him I wanted the grandson to sign on behalf of his grandfather, which he did in front of witnesses. He was very grateful and expressed his appreciation to the Association. He put the money away safely. I also asked the grandson to ensure that the repairs were carried out and follow up with the Department for the repairs.

Generally speaking, the pool and grounds were neat and tidy and the pool was full of water. He cleans the pool twice a week.

I enclose Ernesto's receipt for the money, but I regret it was only on a scrap of paper but it was the only paper I had with me, not knowing if I would meet him then. As and when I am in Dili I will check the memorial out and make sure it's being maintained adequately.
