EDITORIAL

A Brief History of the N.S.W. Branch of the 2/2 Commando Squadron

When I attended the inaugural meeting of the NSW Branch, I had no idea of the wonderful organisation I was getting into, or the time consuming task I would be asked to undertake Gerry Maley was a first Secretary and Jack O'Brien our first President, a great combination to start with. Unfortunately, it wasn't long before Gerry found his job didn't allow him enough time to cope with anything else, so I was inveigled into filling in as Secretary. Jack (the bosun) O'Brien was a person of the Doig mould and he was a real driving force in getting the Branch operating.

Jack's untimely death from cancer in 1952 was a great blow to all of us. He thought of the 2/2 as his family and just before he passed away in Concord hospital he made me promise to

keep his boys together.

Those early days from 1947 until the Courier was born were really hard going. We endeavoured to hold Annual Dinners, smokos picnics and cricket matches, but as the boys got married and began to propagate the

species, things got a bit slower.

I would spend several nights a week down at the Gallipoli Legion Club, typing stencils on an old portable typewriter, then another night either at Bob Smyth's place of business or the Hurstville RSL Club, where Tom (Tuan nograss) Martin was President, churning out hundreds of pages of newsletters, putting them into and addressing over a hundred envelopes, with the result that there was many a night I didn't get home. But in the long run it has been well worth the effort.

Then, thanks to "Bulla" Tait and many other wonderful people in the Golden West, along came the Courier and things became considerably easier.

Over the ensuing nearly half a century there have been many outstanding personalities who have contributed a great deal to keep things going, and to name just a few, there were Bill Bennett, John Darge, Mick Devlin, Ron Hilliard, Bill Coker, Jimmy English, Paddy Kenneally and Alan Luby. There has been a hard core of members who have attended meetings and helped make decisions as they became necessary, and to those people we owe a great debt of gratitude.

Organising the first Sydney Safari in 1968 was probably the most satisfying of the many tasks we have had to cope with, and I am sure all the people who have organised Safaris in W.A., Victoria, South Australia, Queensland and Canberra have been truly happy with the results of their efforts. Every succeeding Safari has seen members come out of the woodwork for the first in forty and even fifty years, and this is all thanks to the *Courier* and its great team.

The 1996 efforts of Neil Hooper, Ralph Conley, Tony Adams, Ron Archer, and their good ladies have been outstanding and they can be really proud.

Vale: 'Casey' COLLIS – 'D' Platoon, Timor.

'Casey' Collis passed away in Belmont, a suburb of Newcastle, two years ago. 'Casey', a close friend of "Curly' O'Neill and Merv Clarke (Squirt Johnson) grew up in Narrabeen on the northern beaches. As youngsters he, Curly and Merv Clark surfed, fished the lake and wandered the hills rising above the shores of Narrabeen Lake. In the thirties it was a carefree life in idyllic surroundings.

In 1941 he joined the AIF, volunteered for the Independent Companies and landed at Dili, Portuguese Timor on 20th January 1942 with the first reinforcements for the No. 2 Independent Company. When 'D' Platoon was formed 'Casey' with other 2/2nd men and the men from Dutch Timor comprised the personnel of the extra Platoon. 'Casey' did not rejoin the Unit after Timor.

After the war he was seen occasionally by Curly O'Neill or Merv Clarke. He was a loner and a traveller. He was also very much his own independent man. Had Curly not met his sister, no one would have know what or where. He has departed as he lived, a conundrum. May he Rest in Peace.

Vale: George Alfred FLETCHER

The sad saga continues, this time on 19th February, 1996, George Fletcher, quite suddenly but after a long and debilitating illness which resulted in his hospitalisation at Home of Peace, Subiaco.

Just what can I pen about this truly wonderful servant of the 2/2nd Commando Association? It will be quite a task to try and tell of all the hard physical work that he accomplished for our Association. His efforts alone in our Memorial Area at Lovekin Drive, Kings Park would fill quite a volume. So many years of tender loving care of the grassed area, mowing and edging the lawn, taking the greatest care of the plaques on each tree, then his great care of the signs at each end of our area. The work he did on those signs alone was just terrific, even providing replacements when originals were thieved. But his work in Kings Park was not all that he did for the Association. Whenever his great skills with all tools were needed he would come forward with some masterpiece that was just so right for the occasion. The way in which he maintained a relationship with the staff at Kings Park was of immense value to the Association when it came to holding of Commemoration Services and the staff co-operation when problems arose in the area. The debt the Association owes to George Fletcher for his marvellous services is of the nature of irrepayable. At least the Association was able to honour him with Life Membership in 1973. He was the continuous Warden of the Kings Park Memorial area from 1968 to 1992 and a Committee member of the Association, again continuously from 1964 to 1992. What a colossal record of service to offer to our great Association.

George was born on 19/10/1923 and attended school in Jolimont and Leederville. He was apprenticed as a carpenter-joiner with Plunkets where he served his time until joining the Army in 1942 and was with the 3rd Field Regiment before he joined the 2/2nd Commando Squadron at Strathpine after training at Canungra served with the Unit in New Britain with distinction.

After demobilisation he returned to the building trade with Plunkets, specialising in the joinery shop where he became a true perfectionist at his trade. He left Plunkets to work with the A.B.C. as a scenery maker when the A.B.C. in W.A. were still doing T.V. shows from the Perth studios in Adelaide Terrace. He left the A.B.C. to join the Water Supply Department, initially as a model maker at their special workshop in Floreat Park, doing models of harbours and weirs. He was very proud of the models he did for the North Dandalup Dam and he also worked on its construction. George was to finish his time with the Water Supply as a very much general hand, doing carpentry, plumbing and even bricklaying where necessary.

George's hobbies were like his work in the construction of things. He was most adept in the making of grandfather clocks of distinct beauty. He loved to work in wood and made many excellent plaques for presentation by the Association to many Councils around Australia. He was also the maker of the famous Calcutt Trophy for sporting events with the Association.

George married Joan Hill in 1947 and was a loving husband and father of Ron, Janette and Margaret. He loved his home and garden and his grandchildren.

As well as the 2/2nd Commando Association he was an active member of the Nollamara R.S.L.

To me personally he was a very dear friend in my times of illness. He and Joan were the truest of helpers to myself and the late Joy. I owe George Fletcher in a big way for all he did for me and now will never be able to repay this debt of gratitude. I really have lost a true mate and friend so I can only say farewell dear George, you were one of the best.

Our sincere condolences and sympathy to Joan, Ron, Janette and Margaret. You have lost a person of great value and a citizen of truest worth.

Vale: Oscar Keith DIGNUM (Dig) Born April 1920 – Died May 5, 1996

Keith Dignum grew up in the Port Adelaide area of Birkenhead, a port suburb hard hit by the Great Depression of the 1930s. Like all young people of that era he would have learned what hardship and struggle was involved in every day life. Leaving school, he procured a job in the motor industry graduating to Duco Sprayer. He joined the pre-war militia, serving in an Artillery Unit based at Fort Largs On the outbreak of World War II Dig immediately volunteered for overseas service even though recruiting hadn't even been announced. In October 1939 he was accepted as a recruit in the 2nd AIF and became SX881 Gunner Dignum, O.C. 2/3rd Field Regiment, AIF. The 2/3rd moved from Woodside to the newly opened camp at Ingleburn on the outskirts of Sydney. From there the Unit embarked for the Middle East in May 1940, sailing on the 'Queen Mary' on its first voyage with Australian troops. The war in Europe took a dramatic change for the worse. The Germans quickly over ran Holland and Belgium. They broke through at Sudan, split the British and French forces and outflanked the Maginot Line. The Queen Mary was diverted to the United Kingdom. The Australians were disembarking in the Clyde as the B.E.F. was being embarked far to the south at Dunkirk for evacuation to England. Dig witnessed the blitz mounted by the Germans in both its phases, initially daylight raids so costly to the German Air Force that it switched to night raids.

In December 1940 the 2/3rd sailed for the Middle East once more, and the Unit was in position in Egypt to take part in the Australian 6th Division advance into Libya in January 1941. By February I2 Bardia, Ťobruk, Derná and Benghazi had fallen. Dig and the 2/3rd went to Greece. During a fighting retreat from the Yugoslav border, Keith Dignum was seriously wounded not long before arriving at their evacuation point. An officer ordered no stretcher cases to be evacuated, meaning Dignum. Two infantry men picked up the stretcher and one of them bluntly told the officer 'If he stays you stay, but you will be dead'. Dig was evacuated to hospital in Crete and was later shipped to a British Army hospital near the Suez Canal. They made a good job of patching him up. Invalided back to Australia for discharge, Dig persuaded the doctors to put him on a course to regain the use of his left arm and shoulder. He made excellent progress, mainly because of his determination to follow the course diligently. He reigined the 2/3rd Field Regiment in April 1942 in Adelaide and proceeded to Cooktown, North Queensland. Transferred to the Independent Companies doing a jungle training course at Canungra prior to joining the 2/2 Independent Company at the end of April 1943. Sailed with that Unit to New Guinea, June 1943 and served in New Guinea and New Britain. When hostilities ceased on August 15, 1945 Dig was in Centre Post, a defensive post being manned by 'B' Troop at that time. On returning to Lamarien on the south coast Dig said 'the war is over, I'm off'. He left New Britain in September 1945. By the time he was discharged Keith Dignum had completed six years in the AIF, serving on three continents, Europe, Africa, Australia, in England, Greece, Crete, Egypt, Libya, New Guinea and New Britain. He fought against Italians, Germans and Japanese. He experienced intensive action, more so than any 2/2nd man in World War II.

Dig married Betty Hoffman, a sister of Ernie Hoffman, 7 Section 2/2nd, Timor, in December 1945. He worked on his father's boring rig for a short period, then returned to the motor trade, working as a Foreman Supervisor with the Ford Company. For the last 13 years of his working career he was an Insurance Assessor.

Dig had many interests, fishing, camping, exploring the Flinders Ranges. He had a comprehensive knowledge of the Fauna, Flora and bird life of that area. He was a student of military history, his interest unfortunately did not extend to studying it from the other side. He was a good family man and a staunch friend. He set high standards of conduct in his dealings with other people and he attained them.

Dig served many years as President of the 2/3 Field Regiment Association and the South Australian Branch of the Commando Association, also President and Secretary of the 2/2 Commando Association South Australian Branch.

SX881 Gunner, Private, Trooper, L/Corporal Dignum, O.K., you were a tough, self reliant confident soldier and man. Te Salutatis.

Dear Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am replying to some concerned members of the Association re: the memorabilia currently on display at the Army Museum in Fremantle, WA.

Firstly let me explain some facts regarding the Museum.

- 1. Some people think that the Army fund and run the museum, this is only partially true, they ONLY supply the building and out going costs, power, water and maintenance of the buildings. All other costs incurred are paid for by donations and door takings.
- 2. The museum is run by a committee headed by a member of the Army appointed by the Commander of Western Region. The rest of the committee are volunteers voted in by the members of the museum. All of the workers at the museum except for the administrator and curator are unpaid volunteers.
- 3. The land and buildings of the old Artillery Barracks have been heritage listed and as the Army now has a policy to preserve their history, the museum will be there for future generations of Australians to enjoy.

The \$5 000 that was donated to the museum is a once off amount and the unit will not have to pay for any further costs associated to your collection. The money was used for the 2 display cabinets which cost approx \$1500 each, part of a full size case to display Joe Poyntons Victory Parade Uniform on a life size dummy and the balance was used for lighting, security and the storage of items not currently on display.

Any future costs incurred in the cleaning and preservation of the 2/2 memorabilia is met by the museum funds. As an example, the preservation of one sheet of A4 paper is approx \$15.00.

The display cases are of the highest order and blend in with the theme of the Original Artillery Barracks which are being renovated back to original condition.

Hoping this dispels the fears that some members have, knowing that their hard earned money is being put to good use by allowing your collection to be preserved for posterity and that future generations of Australians will know that the Second Second Commando Squadron holds a very special place in Australia's Military history.

Brief Report on my part of the 2/2nd's 'Carpentry Aid Project' on East Timor, 1996 – Viv Paust

The 2/2nd Commando Association aims to aid the people of East Timor, and became aware of a need for carpentry instruction in the Don Bosco Training Centre at Comoro, a suburb of Dili

The Training Centre is a live-in compound run by the Salesian Order of the Roman Catholic Church. It is financed and equipped by various benefactors around the world. The Salesians aim to help disadvantaged young people by developing skills that will make them competitive with the 'imported Indonesian work force', mainly from Java.

The carpentry workshop aims to pay its way through commissions for furniture and joinery. It is managed by a young Brother. Seven young men in there have had up to two years experience in woodwork and combine production and instruction to 14 or so trainees. The need was to increase the knowledge of the seven instructors and develop their expertise to pass on this knowledge.

The 2/2nd decided to help in two ways:

1. To provide ten basic tool kits that could be

loaned to any 'graduate' for their initial work 'in the field'.

2. To find a suitable volunteer instructor and finance his visit.

I answered the appeal put over Radio 720's 'Grapevine' programme and became the volunteer instructor. Now retired, I had been a manual arts teacher and university lecturer in furniture design and construction.

As there was no chance of my obtaining a work permit from the Indonesian authorities, I was to travel on the mandatory sixty day visitor arrangement – no visa required. The dates arranged were January 3 to February 29, 1996.

Preparation included counselling by Bob Smyth and John Burridge on the do's and don'ts in East Timor, and my signing a 'no liability' note to the 2/2nd. Medically, I ensured my inoculations were up to date, equipped myself with a first aid kit and anti-malarial capsules and a mosquito net. I also put together a comprehensive collection of teaching materials and had some input into the purchase of the tool kits. Bob Smyth arranged travel tickets and full insurance cover for me.

To save freight and to have tools on hand, it was decided I should take two sets with me. However, excess baggage charges, corruption at Customs in Kupang and the sheer volume of luggage made it less than a good idea. Also, the tools weren't needed for my work.

When I arrived at the Don Bosco Centre I was greeted by Brother Ephrem Santos (an Administrator and Teacher), Father Walter Van Wouwe (the Principal of the Centre), Brother Evaristo (Manager of the carpentry shop) and Father Manuel (the local Parish Priest, who lived in the compound). All spoke English, but that is rare in East Timor. Meal times became the great place for social interaction.

My accommodation was motel style, with desk, bed, wardrobe, radio and fan in my room adjoined to an en-suite. The routine was

6.30 - 7.00am Breakfast

7.30 - 12 noon and 1.30 - 6.00pm Workshop (no work on Sundays)

12.00 noon - 12.30pm Lunch

7.30 - 8pm Dinner.

Meals were served in the dining room and consisted of a wide variety of meat, fish, rice and vegetable dishes, salads and lots of fruit. I was able to have wine or beer when I pleased. Coffee or tea were only served at breakfast as the Salesians don't want stimulants to affect their sleep in their busy and demanding routine.

My washing and ironing was done for me, but for security and privacy reasons I chose to do my own housework in my accommodation.

The carpentry shop was well equipped with benches, hand tools, fixed machinery and portable power tools. However, most required a lot of maintenance. I decided to bring each machine back to pristine condition and teach my instructors to keep them that way. I also worked on the safety and efficiency ethic in the workshop. Over the time I introduced many jigs and labour saving devices to my keen 'students'.

We settled into a routine of two 45 minute formal lessons a day to the seven instructors, with Brother Ephrem as interpreter. The remainder of my time was spent on individual help, commissioning equipment that hadn't been used and generally improving the organisation in the workshop. Preparation for detailed lessons was also time consuming.

I took on a few projects, such as:

- 1. Fitting out the carpentry and electrical storerooms with built-in shelving (this became lessons in design, construction and jigging for a production run).
- 2. Making work stations for 40 trainees in the electrical workshop, including making and fitting 180 drawers.
- 3. Constructing a heavy duty wood lathe for the carpentry shop.
- 4. Making equipment for the local kindergarten and the kindergarten at Atauro Island.

Wood turning was a new experience for them, but so enthusiastic were they that split chisel handles became a thing of the past and some of the furniture they produced had turned components.

During my stay I believe we achieved everything we set out to do. The men learnt an amazing amount in the two months and greatly appreciated what was done for them. I'm sure it wasn't only their knowledge and skills that improved, but their confidence and self esteem also. A bonus, I believe, was that the wider community knew of my visit and took a great interest. Not only was the 'Australian interest' in East Timor in action, but it was seen to be in action. The feedback I received was that it was a morale booster – almost a symbol of hope.

I find it difficult to make recommendations for future projects. The Salesians are very dedicated, capable and efficient people. I would rely on their lead. Finance seems to be relatively easy to get from affluent countries like Japan and USA, and I think the limited resources of the 2/2nd may best be used financing personnel with special skills to pass on, rather than equipment and materials.
