VALE LEW THOMPSON WX12320

It is with great regret we advise of the death of our old comrade Lew who passed away peacefully at the Swan Districts Hospital on 7th February, 1998 at the age of 90 years. Lewis William Paton Thompson was born in Bombay, India on 3rd October, 1907. Not a great deal is known of his early life but we understand he went to South Africa as a young man and spent some years working on an uncle's farm. From there he went to W.A. in the late 20's where he joined his father who ran the old Mt. Lawley Ice Works and as well did refrigeration repair work, which Lew soon picked up. It was here he met a lass working in the office one Una Thomson. Lew courted Una and they were married in September 1941 while Lew was on his pre-embarkation leave. Their marriage went on to last for over 56 years until Lew's passing. Sadly their only child - a son Gilbert - died in his mid thirties with leukemia.

Lew enlisted in the A.I.F. in May 1941 and found his way as an original member of the 2/2nd as a sapper under Don Turton. Lew turned out to be a good sapper. His quiet efficient manner and easy to get on with attitude endeared him to his sapper mates. Don Turton tells of a humorous incident in the early stages of the Timor campaign when an intended ambush went wrong and everyone was ordered to move out, which they did except Lew who was left behind with his machine gun. Fortunately he made it back okay and when asked why he didn't move out his laconic reply was "you know I'm deaf!." After Timor Lew became attached to the 116th Light A.A. Regiment and was eventually discharged in January, 1944.

After the war Lew tried his hand at farming on a property at Mooliabeenie but later gave this away and moved to Wannamal where he and Una took over the Post Office and the school bus contract with Una running the Post Office and Lew driving the bus. Son Gilbert also helped out. The business turned out a winner. Lew and Una were highly respected in the district with both taking an active interest in the local affairs of the community. Finally the years caught up with them and they retired to a unit at Midvale and later to the Morrison Lodge at Midland. In their latter years Jess Epps was kind enough to remain our main contact with Lew and Una.

Lew was always a loyal supporter of the Association and was made a Life Member in 1994. He made a practice of coming down regularly to our annual reunion and commemoration services. He was a lovable and generous man. Don Turton gave a fine eulogy to Lew at the funeral service at Karrakatta on 11th Feb. He and Gerry Green were pall bearers. A nice tribute was also paid

to Lew from a local resident of Wannamal. A good number of country people came down for the service showing the esteem which both he and Una were held by the people they were associated with for so many years.

Thirteen of our members were present, plus Jessie Epps and Lorraine March.

So passed our oldest W.A. member.

To Una, his devoted wife and other relatives we extend our deepest sympathy.

Meeting held in Canberra at 10.00am March 16, 1998

The meeting opened with the Ode recited by Jack Carey.

Len Bagley gave a report on the Courier in which he gave an indication of the numbers of copies distributed, by states, and said that on average the Courier cost \$1000 per issue. He proposed that the frequency of issue should be changed from every two months to every three months because of lack of copy. This proposal was supported unanimously.

DROUGHT

Reports of the drought conditions in Indonesia were of concern to us following the departure of Les and Verna Cranfield.

It was difficult to get reliable information from areas of our interest. Media drought reports coincided with a vital growing period whereby tenfold grain improvement were envisaged. No news for some weeks of Father Jose who does not enjoy good health. Fortunately rain did fall at Fuiloro and the crop should still reach expectations.

Quotes for "Used plant in good condition"

We searched by phone and via ABC radio "Country Hour," areas around Australia for the first two items. A prospect is at Kingaroy Queensland. However we have had to advise Fr. Jose that assessment of value reconditioning, preparation and transport to Gladstone for shipment to Darwin and Surabaya, for transshipment to Kupang or Dili, would make it unviable.

The Indonesian owned shipping service (to which we have been confined) from Singapore to Dili, has been suspended, "until currency problems have improved."

PALLETS FOR DILI

Keith Hayes is storing a 2 pallet load of some 45 typewriters plus projectors, speakers, a video camera, loads of paper etc. which he has collected. Also 2 large cartons of good dress materials donated following a news and radio programme featuring Les and Verna Cranfield's voluntary efforts in East Timor.

FOOD - SEED PROGRAMME

In view of the priority rating of the commodity and the opportunity of producing it using Les Cranfield's improved methods of cultivation, we obtained from Symonds Seeds \$4,713 of seeds suitable for the area.

These have been delivered to Keith Hayes for packing and storage pending delivery to Fr. Jose who will be distributing them to appropriate areas.

It comprises – Runner beans 25kg - \$204, 18 other varieties of seeds total only 19 k.g. for a value of \$4,509. Keith will parcel the sealed bags and cartons into 5kg lots. They will be hand delivered in Dili via air passengers luggage.

You will recall the difficulties in 1994 in obtaining Indonesian approval for an Interplast programme in East Timor. We accordingly had to withdraw our offer of funding which has been applied to alternative projects. A report is attached.

We appreciate and thank you for your Annual Report which reflects the magnificent efforts of teams of Interplast volunteers.

We hope that you will review the possibility of Interplast assistance to East Timor. It is emphasised that the need of the indigenous people is far greater than any who are not living in daily fear of the oppressive surveillance of an intimidating military presence.

The photos enclosed could be discussed by the Interplast Board when next reviewing a training programme for PERAPI members. Should PERAPI or Indonesian Administration resist as expected, a programme for East Timor, then surely it is only fair that these three unfortunate children be brought down to Australia for their turn.

GERALDTON NEWS

The Geraldton City RSL Sub-Branch paid a special tribute to 99 year old Vincenzo 'Jim' Constanting when I briefly referred to his strong support of our Anzac Day observances when laying a wreath from his wheelchair. supported by his son Vince from Perth and Italian President Charlie Mangano. We also extended best wishes for his 100th birthday on November 18. Jim is the last of six Geraldton citizens who were awarded 'Cavaliere Di Vittorio Veneto' gold medals by the Italian Government in 1976 for their service as allies of the British in WWI. This represents a Knight of Vittorio Veneto, a northern Italian area where the British and Italians defeated the Austrians in 1918.

Sharing the main Anzac Day address in support of the motto 'Their Service – Our Heritage' Thomas Kavanagh and Julie Creek of Nagle Catholic College were acclaimed by the crowd of about 2000. Our Women's Auxiliary were extremely busy at the traditional gunfire breakfast with 170 ex-service personnel and others. They included Father Michael Morrisey of Geraldton who was elevated to Major and is Coordinating Chaplain for 13 Brigade RWAR in which there are five Chaplains.

Our main parade was led by WW2 10th Light Horse veteran Owen Fitzpatrick and companion Terry Obst. Capt. W.C. Robinson of that Regiment was Geraldton's first RSL President in 1917. Among the marchers was Fric Weller who had been featured in a newspaper photo in association with Legacy Badge Day which was highly successful.

I was presented with a 50 year continuous service certificate from RSL National Headquarters and I expressed my appreciation of the wonderful support I have received over the years.

Geraldton was privileged to have the first WA showing of the Australian War Memorial's travelling exhibition 'Ivor Hele, the Heroic Figure' which featured more than 60 magnificent drawings and paintings by the official war artist. General Blamey talked Hele into becoming an official war artist, promoting him to Lieutenant in the 2/48th Battalion and providing him with a batman and materials. He continued through the war in the Middle East and Africa before going to New Guinea to produce further paintings for the Australian War Memorial and he recorded war activities in Korea as a Major. The AWM is of special interest to Geraldton because the Korean exhibit includes the metal lined vest worn by our RSL Secretary, Brian Cooper in 1953 when he won the Military Medal for an outstanding example of cool, cheerful and courageous

leadership which was a splendid inspiration to his Section and the US Marines.

A long time friend phoned me after reading about the deterioration of our RSL building, Birdwood House which is owned by the people of Geraldton. He sent me a cheque for tens of thousands of dollars to have the work done by a first class tradesman using the best of materials. Then the Lions Club offered to attend to the kitchen and other parts of the interior of the 1935 building.

Dear Jack,

You may be sick of hearing from me but I feel I must write again in reply to your comment on receiving my last letter. You say I could be right when I assert it was my name used when contact with Australia was made on the I9th April, 1942. I can assure you I am right and I've always known it was Jack who was at the transmitter that night. The name 'Joan' seems to have been the name used which has been the main reason for the confusion.

It was the fictitious name given to a fictitious Cpt. Bill Jones written in several newspapers when news of Timor first hit the headlines on 31 December, 1941 and 1 January, 1943. In some, the correct version was given and in others the following questions and answers were asked Q. Is Cpt Bill Jones there? A. Yes. Bring him to the transmitter. Q. What is the name of your wife? A. Joan etc. etc. As I have repeated many times over the years, there was never any Cpt Bill Jones there, it was dreamt up by some reporter.

I have copies of several papers sent to me from different place and I've also photos and a copy of the wireless section of the film 'Men of Timor' taken by the late Damien Parer, with Jack's and my names on it.

It's a pity all the men involved with Winnie with exception of Cpt George Parker, are dead.

EXTENSION OF THE GOLD CARD TO AUSTRALIAN VETERANS OF WORLD WAR II, AGED 70 YEARS AND OVER WITH QUALIFYING SERVICE FROM THAT CONFLICT

IMPLEMENTATION DATE

1st January, 1999.

COMMON QUESTIONS:

Q. What is a Gold Card?

A. A Gold Card is the gold coloured "Repatriation Health Card – For All Conditions" issued by the Department of Veterans' Affairs. This card enables the holder to access the full range of Repatriation health car benefits.

Health care benefits include private patient hospital care, choice of doctor, pharmaceuticals at the concessional rate, optical care, physiotherapy, dental care, podiatry car and products and chiropractic services, for all medical conditions, irrespective of whether they are war-caused or not.

- **Q.** Who is entitled to full Repatriation health care under the new arrangements?
- A. Under the new arrangements, Australian veterans of World War II (including Australian mariners), aged 70 years and over who have qualifying service as a result of service during World War II, are now entitled to the Gold Card. This applies irrespective of each person's income and assets, or whether they have a war-caused incapacity or injury.
- **Q.** When does the new health care entitlement commence?
- A. The new health care entitlements for the Gold Card commence on 1 January, 1999. For veterans applying for the Gold Card under the new arrangements, the date of entitlement will be the date of application or 1 January, 1999, whichever is the later.
- Q. Why won't the Gold Card be available until 1 January, 1999?
- A. The necessary legislation needs to be passed by the Parliament and veterans need to have sufficient time to lodge their application for a Gold Card and have their World War II qualifying service determined before a Gold Card can be issued to them.
- Q. What is World War II qualifying service?
- A. Generally, World War II qualifying service is service by Australian veterans while in danger from hostile forces of the enemy. Most of those World War II veterans have this qualifying service as a result of their service outside Australia during the period of hostilities from 3 September, 1939 to 29 October 1945 (inclusive).

Certain World War II service within Australia while in danger from hostile forces of the enemy is also classified as qualifying service.

SPECIFIC QUESTIONS ON VETERANS' ELIGIBILITY FOR THE GOLD CARD

- Q. Do I have to have a war-caused disability to be entitled to the Gold Card under the new arrangements?
- A. No, you do not need to have any disabilities accepted as war caused to be entitled to a Gold Card under the new arrangements.
- Q. Is the Gold Card under the new arrangements means tested?
- A. The Government has decided to extend

Gold Card entitlement to all Australian veterans aged 70 years or over with World War II qualifying service regardless of their income and assets.

- Q. Do I need to apply for the Gold Card?
- A. You may not need to apply for the Gold Card. If you are already receiving a service pension on the basis of your World War II service, but have not previously been entitled to a Gold Card, and you are aged 70 years or over, the Gold Card will be sent to you automatically.

The Department of Veterans' Affairs is also aware from its records that there are many veterans receiving a DVA pension, but not a Service Pension, who may also qualify under these new arrangements. Where these veterans are able to be identified from the Department's records, the Department will be writing to them and inviting them to lodge a claim.

If you consider that you fit into one of the above groups, but do not hear from the Department by the end of July I 998, you should contact the Department on the GOLD CARD HOTLINE 1300 555 125.

All other veterans who believe that they may meet the criteria, need to apply by lodging an application form with the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

The application form for the Gold Card will be available by telephoning the Department of Veterans' Affairs on the **GOLD CARD HOTLINE** for the cost of a local call.

Gold Card benefits under the new arrangements are to commence from 1 January, 1999 or from the date your application form is received by the Department, whichever is the later date.

- Q. I have World War II qualifying service and a White Card do I need to apply for a Gold Card?
- **A.** If you already receive Service Pension then you need not apply as your Gold Card will automatically be sent to you.

If you do not have Service Pension but you receive a Disability Pension we will write to you inviting you to apply for a Gold Card.

If you do not receive any pension from DVA you will need to apply for a Gold Card.

- Q. I have World War II qualifying service but I don't get a Service Pension. Am I eligible for the Gold Card?
- A. Provided you are 70 years of age or over, you will now be eligible for the Gold Card even if Service Pension is not payable. Under these new arrangements, your financial circumstances will not affect your entitlement to the Gold Card.

- Q. I have been told previously that I do NOT have World War II qualifying service. Should I apply for a Gold Card?
- A. If you have new information relevant to your World War II qualifying service, you may wish to apply for a Gold Card and you should include that new information with your application form.
- Q. Do I have to re-apply if I have been told previously that I DO have World War II qualifying service?
- **A.** If you have World War II qualifying service and do not currently receive a pension from the Department of Veterans' Affairs you should apply for the Gold Card.
- Q. I served with the British or Allied forces. Am I eligible for a Gold Card?
- A. You are not eligible for a Gold Card under these new arrangements if you are a Commonwealth or Allied veteran who served with a Commonwealth or Allied force during World War II.

There are, however, some veterans who had a close connection to Australia before enlisting in Commonwealth or allied forces. If you consider that these circumstances apply to you and that you might be eligible, you should contact the Department of Veterans' Affairs.
